Dewey: -E- From the quiet of being the first one awake in the morning to "sweet dreams quiet" when the last light is turned off, simple text explores the many kinds of quiet that can exist during the day.</p>
<p>Chester's Masterpiece By Watt, Melanie, 1975- Dewey: -E- A conflict over the creative process ensues when Chester, an egotistical cat, decides to produce a masterpiece.</p>	<p>City Dog, Country Frog By Willems, Mo. Dewey: -E- When City Dog comes to the country, he meets Country Frog for the first time, and every season afterward, the two have a fun time playing together.</p>

Dewey: -E- On the night before her aunt's baby shower, a young girl who wishes for a pet imagines it rains cats, dogs, and other animals.</p>
